Monitoring Report for Radio Station WWYD on 970 kHz.

Monday  
Date July 10, 1972 Monitoring period 6:00 AM to 6:08 AM Eastern Daylight Time.

It was my pleasure to monitor transmissions from your station during the above period. As proof of reception I offer this log of items heard:


6:00 The National Anthem was broadcast, after which this sign on announcement was given - "Good Morning - This is radio station WWYD in Pineville, West Virginia, resuming broadcasting activities for today. WWYD is owned & operated by The Wyoming Broadcasting Company transmitting daily on an assigned frequency of 970 kilocycles, with a power of 1000 watts. We invite you to stay tuned throughout the day for a variety of entertainment. Then electronic type music was played, followed by an announcement - "The sound of today (more music) WWYD, Pineville".

6:01 Dateline news, with Randy Parks (I think) - first world & national news was given.

6:03 Your signal faded (over)

On the basis of the above details, I wish to request a brief letter confirming the fact that I have received your station's signals. I collect these letters as a hobby and would be most pleased to add your confirmation to my collection. For your convenience in replying I have enclosed return postage. ### Technical Information

Receiving equipment: Hammarlund HQ-180A with 4½ foot loop

Interfering stations: Very little of your sign on - you were way on top of 970. However, your signal deteriorated gradually & you were subject to interference - Reception conditions: Excellent - clear, about 60° no static Other stations confirmed in your area: WULS, WCIR, WWDN, Beckley, WAFB, Hillsboro, Va - which became over-

6:05 As you became audible again, West Virginia news was in progress  
6:08 A weather forecast was given & you faded again. This time, I was unable to hear you again.
