Dear Mr. Wesolowski:

We are terribly sorry a confirmation of your reception report did not reach you last year. Possibly the Chief engineer who was here then misplaced your report.

The report was correct, according to our logs. As a matter of fact, that sign-on was recorded and we still use it on occasion. According to our logs, we used that sign-on on Monday, February 22, 1960.

Our station operates with 5000 watts daytime and 500 watts with a directional antenna at night. Our towers, three of them, are 260 feet tall. Our studios are located in the heart of Athens and the transmitter is located about two miles north of the studios. We are trying to present programs that appeal to adult audience here in Athens, however, we present two hours of "Junk" music at night for the teenagers.

I am very much interested in your antenna. I had always considered a Rhombic to be too large an antenna to use on the lower frequencies. I would like to have a diagram of it and the method you use to resonate it in the broadcast band. I have always had very good results with a shielded loop and wonder if you have ever tried one.

Thank you for your report and I hope you are able to hear us again sometime in the future.
