Dear Sir:

W. F. U. L. is pleased to hear that you picked up our signal check July 27, 1961. These checks are run the last Thursday morning at 12:15 A.M. (C.S.T.) in each month. The FCC. has a man listening in Birmingham Alabama, and he reports to us our aural deviation if there is any. Since Birmingham is approximately 300 miles from us, it is necessary that we run these frequency checks at night. Many times we remain on the air after the check to play music and ask for mail.

W. F. U. L. is owned and operated by Mrs. Jo Westpheling. It operates on a frequency of 1,270 kilocycles with a power of 1,000 watts (daytime only) on A.M. and 104.9 megacycles with a power of 500 watts on F.M. F.M. duplicates A.M. in programming. Our tower is 213 feet tall (guide wire supported). The studio and transmitter are located .3 of a mile from the city limits of Fulton Kentucky (Population about 4,000). All of

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transmitting equipment was manufactured by the Gates Company.

Fulton Kentucky is located in the extreme southwestern portion of the state, about 20 miles east of the Mississippi River. Fulton Kentucky and South Fulton Tennessee share the station since the two cities are separated only by the Kentucky - Tennessee state line. W. F. U. L. has five announcers and 3 engineers. They are Gene Gardner (announcer and engineer), Herbie Cathey, Jim Clark, J. W. Richardson, Joe O'Conner, and Chief Engineer Kenneth Turner. We certainly do appreciate you taking the time and trouble to write us. Please write and tell us every time you hear W. F. U. L. on the air. Again, Thank you very much.
