KBOZ-AM is licensed by the Federal Communications Commission as a regional radio station, serving the Bozeman, Montana area. The station began broadcasting to the Gallatin Valley on 19-Dec-75. We recently celebrated our first twenty years of operation.

KBOZ-AM operates with 5,000 Watts, utilizing a sharp directional pattern from sunset to sunrise. The directional array consists of five 245 foot (75 meter) towers in a line. The main lobes of the directional pattern are on azimuths of 45° and 225°, referenced to true north. During day hours, the station operates with 5,000 Watts in a non-directional mode, utilizing just the center tower of the five-tower array.

KBOZ-AM is owned by Deschutes River Broadcasting, based in Portland, Oregon. The Bozeman operation includes KBOZ-AM, KBOZ-FM, and KATH-FM. All three studios are located in a building near the AM towers. The stations share a total staff of thirty full-time employees, and seven part-time employees. Deschutes River Broadcasting operates other radio stations in Billings, Richland-Pasco-Kennewick, and Medford.

This high Rocky Mountain Valley is rich farming country. Crops grown here include potatoes, wheat, barley, and alfalfa. Farmers in this area produce the seed potatoes for the "Famous Potatoes," grown in Idaho. Beef cattle and sheep are also raised in the Gallatin Valley. Mining and lumber are still important activities, but much less than in former times.


