Dear Mr. Thomas:

We were very pleased to receive your three reports on our signal as heard in Proctorville November 11th, 1941, September 23rd, 1944, and October 16th 1944 respectively. Please accept this letter and the enclosed cards as our verification.

On June 13th, 1944 we increased our power to 1000 watts and moved to 1350 kc. We stayed on the air until midnight, Pacific time for a while, and then found it necessary to resume signing off at eleven. It is not likely that you will hear much from us as long as WADC continues to stay on until 2:00 am EWT. However, if you should pick us up we would certainly appreciate more reports from you.

We hope to put on a special DX broadcast March 1st from 2:30 until 3:30 am EWT as suggested by the National Radio Club and hope that you will be listening at that time.
