

Dear Mr. Thomas,

This is to inform you, with reference to your letter of the 2nd Oct. 1945. that, unfortunately, we cannot completely verify your reception of the 2nd Febr. of Radio Budapest 546 Kc /HAL 3/. In fact, our station did transmit at that time, but our programme is not in keeping with your observations. We broadcast from 8.00 to 8.26 GMT Frontmessages /Recordings/ and from 8.26 to 8.54 GMT Marches /Records./


We never used call HAL 3 on our 546 Kc broadcasting station. It figures on the international "Nomenclature" as being the call of the station.

On the 2nd Febr. 1943 we used as pause-sign the first tacts of the "Rákóczy-March". The power of the station was at this time 120 Kws.

Unfortunately, it is not likely you could hear Radio Budapest in the near future, in view of the fact that our 120 Kws station was destroyed by the Germans. We transmit at the time being with a 20 Kws station on 546 Kc.
