Dear Sir:

Certainly do want to thank you very much for your reception report of our station, which was correct in every respect. It makes us feel fine to know that our transmitter is getting out so well.


This station is used for fire fighting work and is on every day from 9AM until 9PM. Our transmitter is a Collins 150C with a power output of 100 watts to the ant. Antenna is a steel vertical tower 90 feet high.

We have 15 fire-patrol trucks all scattered over about 375,000 acres of pine forest. Each truck is equipped with radio and fire fighting equipment. Also we have nine fire towers equally spaced over this area and all connected by telephone to the station here. When they phone in a fire and its location, we broadcast to the patrol truck that is in the area and send him to the fire. We operate on 2726 Kc.

Want to thank you again for your report of Nov. 29, 1938 at 5:45 EST. You may take this letter as a verification of your reception. We would appreciate hearing from you again any time you hear us. We make a routine broadcast every half hour so that the trucks may check their receivers to see that they are working. Make a broadcast on the 15th and 45th minute of every hour. 5:15 & 5:45 etc. And in addition to all fire broadcasts, which we make at the time that they break out.
