
Dear Radio Friends:

Your verifications were correct and glad to hear of your interest and it is the first we have had from your section. It happened to be on a early morning when we were giving out election returns...We are a little 250 watter and the last to recieve a license since the outbreak of war. We are not elaborate but very nice and very homey. Our studios are in the heart of LaFayette ..the third florr of a very nice office building and the transmitter is located about  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile away on four acres on the banks of the Wabash River in the swamp lands.. Yes after 12:00 at night we get New Orleans (250) very clear on our channel and I understand when ever they go off for readjustments we barge into there territory the same way. Odd but true. We have a grand signal only interested in 35 Miles but do travel a good 77 miles.... All R C A equipment...Formally was WFAM South Bend 100 Watter..till we ourchased same.

Thanks for the interest again and may we meet on the waves again we are on test every 1st & 3rd Saturday morning at 1:00-1:15PM
