We received your interesting report this morning and we want to thank you for it. You must have had a fine trip and you were well occupied certainly. This is the first mobile report that we can remember receiving. We don't keep a record of each selection that we play, but the ones that you report are typical, and the announcements and weather report at 7 A.M. checks.

We didn't think that our F.M. signal went as far as you report and it is pleasant to know it, but, for practical purposes, not too important.

Our A.M. Transmitter is 250 Watts.

Our F.M. Transmitter is 3.5 K.W.

Our immediate interest is to put out as good a signal as we can in our immediate vicinity with our A.M. Transmitter and throw in the F.M. for those who like it. Therefore your reports on quality are more valuable than those on distance. There aren't too many F.M. receivers used around here. The majority of the listeners prefer to listen to A.M.

There is a section up here around the towns of Canton and Dixfield, where reception of all A.M. stations is difficult. People up there report splendid reception from our F.M. station. It has no real value to us because it is too far away to sell our product, but it is interesting.
