Dear Sir:

you will be surprised to see my name down below, as perhaps you have heard very much from little station NRH in Heredia Costa Rica.

I came to this city to build up a transmitter for them and of course in both waves, the short and the long. We have been working irregularly but will do some regular work after a while just to let the world know that we are in the air as a sister station to my Ti-4-NRH. I have been here two months and I am ready to return next wednesday to Costa Rica to follow the work of NRH. In the mean time I have been replying the letters received here and addressed to YN-CRG, which stands for YN the letters of Nicaragua under international call, and CRG as the initials for the society "Compañía Radio Granada" of which you can explain in any magazine.

We are working with 150 watts power on 44.7 meters and on 344 meters, but our schedule is at present irregular, as we are doing a lot of broadcasting under commercial activity.

Your report is OK for February 7th and I thank you very much. Indeed you listened to it with very good power and clearness. No doubt that you are an International Radio Champion.....undisputed. I do not recollect but I think you have a verification from Ti-4NRH. I know nothing of those stations in Nicaragua, under the call letters you mention, as they are presumably some telegraphic small stations which the Government uses for correspondence between towns.

This company is going to have some verifications and as soon as they have them printed they will be sent to you for this letters will be kept on file respectively.
