Yes, I can verify your report.
WCHL was operating with 1000 watts non-directional until
4:07 AM then we returned to night pattern with 1000 watts.

WCHL's directional pattern has two major lobes; East-North-East, and West-South-West, and a minor lobe North-Northwest. Surprisingly we receive many more reports Florida (Tampa area) than any other section of the country. The following, in descending number of reports, make up the remainder of the areas we have received DX letters from: Northern Ohio; Washington, D.C. area; Chicago area; New York area; Central Indiana; West Virginia; and Michigan.

Most unusual to me is that I have never received a report from any point within our main lobes, which travels on an azimuth over Texarkana, Texas; Huntsville, Ala.; Chattanooga, Tenn; Ashville, N.C.; and so on.

WCHL is planing some modifications in our overall signal and when they are completed I would like to conduct another test.
