We have for reply your very complimentary and detailed report of reception of WHIP just before our sign off at 6:30 on September 3. Since you have a pretty complete history of the call WHIP in its two prior assignments to broadcast stations, it might also be interesting for you to know that we got it by preference assignment just after it was released from ship service.


For the records, please accept this as official confirmation of your report of reception. With your collection of more than 3000 verifications, you no doubt have some one or more of previously owned stations of mine, in order being, WNRC-WBIG, WMFR, WMRC, WEGO, WAYN, WWNF and WHIP. Along with WHIP I still have WAYN in Rockingham.

I hold the first call assigned, W4AA, for amateur use which I originally received November 24, 1919. Since I also had a call, 4DV issued in April, 1916, prior to World War 1, the FCC recently gave me an amateur extra class license under the so called "Grandfather" privilege.

Ed Stanton, our chief here at WHIP has been with me since shortly after his release from World War 11 service and has had a hand in the plant equipment at WWNF, WAYN, WEGO and WHIP.

Ordinarily information of the above sort is not included in verifications, but a confirmed old time DX hound such as you are would no doubt have an interest in such comment where as it would be of little or no interest to average listeners.
