



NORTH CAROLINA STATE CAPITOL

The state capitol building in Raleigh is considered to be unique among buildings of its kind since it is a perfect specimen of Grecian architecture. The east and west vestibules, and the rotunda are exact reproductions of sections of the famous Greek Parthenon and Acropolis.

The stone used in the capitol building was quarried near the property where the transmitter of WRAL is now located. The first railroad in North Carolina was built from the quarry to the present site of the capitol—a distance of about two miles—for the purpose of hauling the stone.

The present capitol building was completed in 1839 at a cost of \$530,000, which is a comparatively small expenditure for a state capitol now, but at the time of construction represented more than five times the total annual income from all state taxes.
