Thanks for your report on our d-x attempt on Feb. 17th. Apparently the QRM was pretty rough all over that night, but did get a few reports. As you reported...the coded call letters were the best part of the show. I swiped the idea from WCMC, Wildwood, N.J. when they ran a similar test last December. (Maybe it's a regular procedure, but that's the first time I heard it).

Other reports were received from near Chicago, Erie, Pa., Louisville, Toronto, Detroit, Grand Rapids, Mich., Buffalo, and Philadelphia.

I hope to try again next winter...possibly combine it with our proof-of-performance tests so that we could run our 1000 watt daytime power.

If you heard WTOL in 1938, it was probably with 100 watts on 1200 Kc. That was when the place first started at a different location. I have only been here since 1942, but have always been interested in the station and it's history.

Again thanks, and my apologies that you didn't hear more to pay you for losing the sleep.
