Dear sir:

Please excuse the long delay brought in answering your letter. I have been absent for a long time from my office and been very busy with the construction of our new radio station CJLM in Joliette, Que.

Accept our best thanks for the kind interest you show for our radio station CJSO, Sorel.

Thinking you might appreciate a brief description regarding the progress of our Radio Station since its opening, we give you the following information: The broadcasting started on January 6 1945 with a 100W power and on 1400 Kc frequency. Next year, on August 7th 1946, the power was extended to 250W and besides, a 100W in case of emergency was allowed.

Since April 1st 1950, CJSO operates with a 1000W power and on 1320 Kc frequency with a 250W transmitter in case of emergency.

The actual site of the transmitter is determined like this: Latitude  $45^{\circ} - 59 \text{ min} - 55 \text{ sec}$  - North; longitude  $73^{\circ} - 10 \text{ min} - 6 \text{ sec}$  - West. CJSO is equipped with a system of directional antennas including two towers of two hundred foot high each.

The station is on the air Monday through Saturday from 6.55 a.m. to 8.00 p.m., and on Sunday from 9.30 a.m. to 8.00 p.m. The sign-off will be at midnight after October 16th, 1960.

The report you sent us was exact in every way, and we hope that this summary will be useful to you and will give you a certain idea on our Radio Station CJSO. Be assured that it is always a pleasure to us to receive your appreciation.
