Received your report that you had received our station on February 14, and was very much surprised and delighted. Yes, this is to verify that we were broadcasting an equipment test on that date, am overwhelmed that our signal came in as well as your report indicated there.

No, this was not a regular scheduled equipment test, the reason for the test was that we just installed a new Gates BC-1J transmitter, and was checking it out. The old rig we had was a composite job that was ready to fall apart.

We have a 275' shunt-fed tower, (grounded at base), with, as I have already said, a BC-1J Gates transmitter. This is the latest one out by Gates, and I believe it is really a nice rig!

Our console was also a composite rig at the time of the test, however we are now in the process of installing a new Gatesway console which we are using at the present time.
