Thank you for your letter of a recent date stating that you heard our station on October 30th between 6:00 and 6:30 AM EDST.

After checking your report against our station log for that period, I find it to be correct in every respect. It is therefore a pleasure for me to confirm your reception of WNIX, Springfield, Vermont during the above mentioned time.


As you can probably guess, we have been deluged with reports since we started signing-on an hour earlier than most other eastern stations. For the first time, Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts and Vermont remained on Daylight Time during October. This has given us a fine signal in the midwest and we have received over 150 reports of reception in that area.

As you mentioned in your report, we are a young station, going on the air for the first time in May of this year. We did conduct equipment tests for three nights in May and received less reports than we have since the first of October. We are a 1000 watt daytime station with non-directional antenna system.

Thank you again for your report and the associated material. If you would care for another try at hearing us, I suggest the last Tuesday of every month from 12:00 midnight until 12:15 AM EST. We broadcast during this period for frequency check purposes and give call letters every three minutes interspaces with 1000 cycles.
