Greetings, to a fellow Ohioan! In answer to your letter of February, 14, reporting reception of WJJM from 4:15 to 4:30 A.M. EST time, (3:15 to 3:30 A.M. CST.)

Please be advised that this letter will verify your reception of the WJJM signal in Proctorville. Your report was excellent, and was of vital interest to the engineering staff.

All DX reports are welcomed by the station and verifications are promptly signed and mailed to the DX'er. DX'ing is one of the most interesting hobbies. I was a DX'er back in the '30's before I got into commercial radio. This was back in Cincinnati, the old home town.


By the way, yours is the first report we've received where the DX'er wasn't a member of the National Radio Club...this is a DX club with headquarters in Buffalo, N.Y.

WJJM's tower, a 198 feet affair is located on East Hill, the highest point in Lewisburg and sits upon almost solid rock. Also the ground conductivity is very poor in this section of the Country. Despite this drawback, WJJM's 250 watts seems to reach out rather far. Our most distant DX report to date is from Invercargill, New Zealand. This is 7000 miles "down under" from Lewisburg.

WJJM's regular monthly FCC frequency check is the same...the second Thursday of the month, from 3:00 to 3:30 A.M. CST. You might pass this information along to any fellow DX'er. It is our policy to verify all correct reports on reception.

Mr. R.C. Wiley, Assistant to the Chief Engineer wishes me to express his personal thanks for your co-operation. Mr. Wiley conducts the monthly FCC checks. From me, thanks also and many happy hours with your DX'ing and many "good catches" in the future.
