

Church Donates Equipment

3 AREA GROUPS BENEFIT FROM COMPUTERS

When St. Andrew Presbyterian Church recently upgraded its sanctuary sound system, three local clubs got its old, yet still reliable equipment.

The Computer Club Inc. received some surplus computer equipment, which will be either repaired or cannibalized for parts and used in area schools or local not-for-profit organizations. The club has a longstanding reputation for community service projects.

The second recipient was the DX Audio Service, a volunteer project of the National Radio Club Inc. The equipment donated by the church will aid the

service in the production of audio cassette tapes for the blind.

And the third group, the Historical Society of Greater Sun City Center Inc., will use the audio and video equipment it received to make video tapes on the community's history for viewing in various venues around town.

Speaking on behalf of St. Andrew Presbyterian Church, Pastor Larry Lewis expressed great satisfaction on the equipment transfer. He said it met his goal of one group helping another.

St. Andrew's purchased the new sound and video editing system to significantly upgrade the sound quality within its sanctuary. The move will especially benefit the hard of hearing among the congregation and the improved video-making capacity will benefit those unable to attend Sunday services.
